

## The Legend of Bluidy Mackenzie

The Black Masoleum located in the Greyfriar's Cemetary in Edinburgh, Scotland is said to be home to the United Kingdom's most active poltergeist and is the final resting place of George Mackenzie. Born in 1636, Mackenzie was a Scottish lawyer whose career was most noted for the prosecution of the Covenanters. The Covenanters challenged the idea that the royal family could dictate the particulars of religion, and such a belief led to rampant discrimination and prosecution. Mackenzie imprisoned some 1200 Covenanters on the grounds at Greyfriar Cemetery and earned the moniker "Bluidy Mackenzie" for his penchant for torture and mistreatment of the prisoners. In less than a year in the prison, only 48 Covenanters remained.

Mackenzie died in 1691, and was ironically buried near the prison. However, reports of spiritual activity didn't emerge until 1999. The story goes that a homeless man was seeking shelter from the weather, and entered the Black Masoleum. While attempting to root around in the coffins, he fell through the floor and landed in a plague pit filled with the bones of plague victims. The man panicked, and fled, scaring a local dog walker in the process. Reports of paranormal activity soon emerged – a woman was said to have been blown back from the Masoleum by an icy wind. Others have reported a foreboding feeling, and obtaining injuries from a spirit. A local man started the City of the Dead Tour company to provide ghost tours of the area after the city shuttered the Masoleum, believing it too dangerous to remain open to the public.

Despite two attempted exorcisms, there are still hundreds of reports of visitors falling ill, becoming bruised or burned, or being scratched by some malevolent spirit. So what changed to cause all this activity? Legend has it Bluidy Mackenzie was awoken from his eternal sleep, and is none too pleased at being disturbed.

# **Queensboro/MacDougall Online Store Now Live!**

The Clan MacDougall Society of North America (CMSNA) has established an on-line store account with the Queensboro Company out of Wilmington, NC. They are a well-established company with very good customer service. The online store has a series of logos that canbe applied to a wide variety of garments as you choose tocreate your own MacDougall and MacDowall clan related apparel. (with more to come!) As an additional benefit, a portion of each order in the on-line store is set aside as a donation in support CMSNA.

Go to <a href="https://CMSNA.qbstores.com">https://CMSNA.qbstores.com</a> to access the store. Once there, look for the "Register" link at the top, right of the site. Follow the instructions there to create your own account. Once you sign up, if you choose, Queensboro will send you emails and discount promotions that you can take advantage of to save some money through the on-line store.

Once in the online store, you will find two tabs: Logos and Apparel. The "logos" are the designs available, and the "apparel" are the different types of apparel you can order those designs on: from hats, towels, shirts, fleece, outerwear, etc.

#### TWO IMPORTANT THINGS TO NOTE:

The CMSNA.qbstores.com online store is intended to provide quality, branded apparel to North American CMSNA members, while supporting the work of the Society. Our cousins in Great Britain and elsewhere are more than welcome to create an account and use the on-line store as well, as Queensboro does have international shipping (at extra cost of course). We are currently seeking a similar supplier in Canada to help reduce shipping costs for our members there.

The online store is an official CMSNA project, but it is fully managed by our friends at Queensboro. Please contact Queensboro directly to solve any issues you may encounter in registering for or using the store. CMSNA does nothave the capability to help you with that, only Queensboro does. If you must talk to someone at Queensboro, you go to Queensboro company website and you can schedule a time to talk with a customer representative, or use their chat and/or email features. If you want to talk to someone the same day, it is best to schedule in the morning (EST) for a time later in the day, otherwise you can schedule a time for the following work day. They are very good about calling you at the scheduled time.

We hope you find your CMSNA on-line store beneficial and user friendly. And remember, each time you purchase something from the CMSNA online store, you are helping keep CMSNA vital as an organization for the future!

# MacDougall DNA Project

Clan MacDougall is one of the oldest clans in Scottish history, tracing its roots back to the mid-12<sup>th</sup>-century. Somerled, a Norse-Gaelic lord, founded the Kingdom of Argyll and the Isles and is widely portrayed as a Celtic hero. Somerled is known to have had at least five sons and one daughter. His son Dugald (also seen spelled as Dubgall and Dougall) became the King of the Isles and the nucleus for Clan MacDougall.

Men are made men, biologically, through the presence of the Y-chromosome (women have two X-chromosomes). The Y-chromosome is passed down from father to son, and genetic

testing can identify direct paternal ancestors through this chromosomal testing. The MacDougall DNA Research Project seeks to map this paternal MacDougall ancestral bloodline. Participation in the project is currently free for any MacDougall man interested should he meet the required criteria found on the website.
