1999 REPORT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING GRANDFATHER MOUNTAIN HIGHLAND GAMES

The 35th Annual Meeting of the Membership of Clan MacDougall Society of North America, Inc. was held at the Eseeola Lodge in Linville, North Carolina on Friday, July 9, 1999. Following the call to order by President Richard MacDougall and prayer by Troy McDougal, Recording Secretary/Archivist, everyone introduced themselves. With attendance of over thirty members present, a quorum was announced and the business began.

William Leroy, Treasurer/Membership Secretary, reported that the clan is financially strong, with a net income realized in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1999 totaling \$7,547.88. Mr. Leroy also reported that the membership has made donations to the MacDougall Foundation in excess of \$1,700.00 and the Gylen Castle Repair Fund increased by over \$3,000.00 during the same period. He also reported that the active membership has risen to 932 members, an increase of nearly 11% over last year. We have almost doubled our active membership in the last three years.

William Ermatinger, Genealogist, reported that he has had a quiet year. He maintains a computer database of all the information members provide to him regarding their genealogy, which is only as complete as the membership makes it. He provides all the information to the Odom Library, which is equipped with a computer for review of our database, as well as paper copies of the genealogical sheets and other data. This resource is available to anyone who visits the Library.

Pat McDougall, *Tartan* Editor, reported that since there were some problems with

the clan newsletter contest, we did not enter the *Tartan* this year. She also urged the membership to keep the *Tartan* interesting by sending her news of ANY happening in their family.

Walter Macdougall, chair of the Heritage Committee, reported on the

videos the committee is putting together. Originally, the committee planned to make one video covering the history of the MacDougalls and the MacDowells. As they began to work on the project, however,

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

He has already reconnoitered two highland games in two states, and will be representing us as soon as he puts his games kit together. He obviously needs help in every state, because of the great distances. So if you would be willing to help please get in touch with me and I will put you in touch with him.

they realized that each of these clans has enough interesting history for a video of its own, and they decided to concentrate on the MacDougalls first. The video will take the format of narrated slides that will be less costly than filming in motion, but will still be very effective. The music of the clan will also be featured throughout the video. One problem the committee has had is condensing the volumes of information they have gathered into an interesting narrative. Much of the excess information will be arranged by topic and provided to the Archivist for distribution on a request basis. The committee is investigating the possibility of issuing the production as both a videocassette and a CD Rom.

President Richard MacDougal reported that the Gylen Castle Repair fund has continued to increase in receipts due, in large part, to the success of raffles and the increased benevolence of the members. He hopes this support of the repair of Gylen Castle will continue to hold a high priority with the members. He reported that we have new representatives in Washington, DC, Michigan, Kansas, Missouri, Colorado, Arkansas, Hawaii and Maryland, as well as two new Regional Commissioners. Janet Wimer will represent the Midwest region and the Southwest region's commissioner is Harold F. MacDowell, Jr., who is beginning work in this region which has not been represented by Clan MacDougal for some time, and in which the Clan has not been present at any games during the past year. President MacDougal reported that the Clan was represented at a total of 112 events during the past year, an increase of 32% over 1997.

The business of the clan has become smoother by improvements in the number of officers and commissioners who have email, the Clan MacDougal website and the ability of Regional Commissioners and Directors to vote by proxy at the annual meetings. The society has also joined funds with the Foundation to make available approximately \$2,000 per year in scholarships to encourage young people in Scottish music, dance, athletics and other areas of Scottish heritage. The Society is also underwriting the production of a video of Clan MacDougal heritage, and the scanning of records accumulated by the late Miss Hope MacDougal in Oban. Each of these projects will be made available to the members at some point.

In 1998, President MacDougal, on the recommendation of the Regional Commissioners, presented four Somerled awards for outstanding service to the Society. The awards went to Margaret McLeod, Marjorie McLeod, Don and Sandy MacDougal, and Ed and Sheila McDowell.

Finally, President MacDougal led us in a remembrance of the unfortunate deaths of Claud Baker, former Midwest Regional Commissioner, Miss Hope MacDougal of MacDougal, and her sister, Jean MacDougal Hadfield, mother of our present Chief, Madam Morag MacDougal of MacDougal. President MacDougal pointed out that the passing of Miss Hope and Jean represents the end of their generation of the direct line through the Chiefs of Clan MacDougal. A moment of silent prayer was held in honor and remembrance of these losses.

President MacDougal ended the meeting by presenting the 1999 Somerled award to James W. McDougal who retired from his position as Southeast Regional Commissioner. In addition, he presented Mr. McDougal with a quach inscribed with his name and the dates of service. Mr. McDougal was one of the original Regional Commissioner.

Following the Annual Meeting, the members enjoyed a social hour on the lovely grounds of the Eseeola Lodge. The Piper, Briant Lee, summoned all to a lovely dinner which featured a special series of toasts to Mr. and Mrs. Nathaniel Maxwell McDougald, III who were married on the games filed earlier in the day. The evening ended with the vocal talents of Richard Van Valkenburgh. A goof time was had by all. ☺

I had another wet walk to Dunstaffnage Castle. I told the gift shop attendant that I had come to take back the castle from the Campbells. She said, "Take it!"

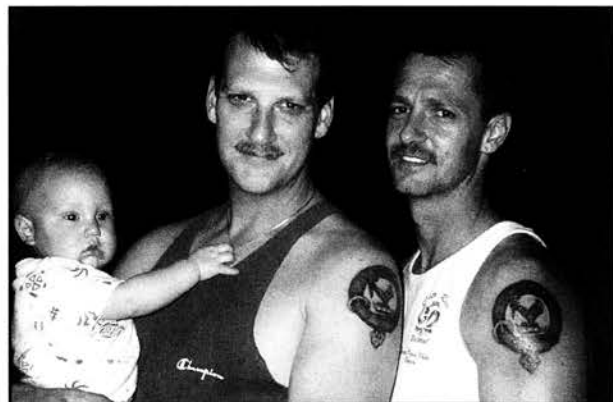

More About Clinton Dugald MacDougall

While Jeanne and I were manning the MacDougall tent at the McHenry Highland Games at Deep Creek Lake in Maryland in June this year, a man approached and asked if we knew of the Civil War General MacDougall. I said that I had not heard of him. The man, a Civil War enactor, told me that MacDougall had served at Gettysburg.

Some weeks later my young cousin Peter McDougall visited us from Vermont where he is a student at the Vermont Law School. "What would you like to see while you are here, Pete?" I asked. "How about Gettysburg?" he said.

So on the following Saturday, Pete and I toured the Gettysburg battlefield, climbing up and down Cemetery Ridge, the Union stronghold, and walking out into the field of Pickett's charge to relive the grief with which Robert E. Lee greeted his defeated men. While we were at the visitor's center, I enquired about General MacDougall. The ranger told me that MacDougall was from New York, but knew little else. He called over a young college student who was from upstate New York and it turned out that the

drummer boy whom he was reenacting for the summer was from the same town and the same unit, the 11th New York Infantry, as MacDougall. He knew that MacDougall had been something of a hero as he had been wounded in battle but continued to lead his men until the fight was over. The ranger handed me a form for a file search of the National Park Library at Gettysburg and promised someone would provide me with whatever information on our kinsman that they could find.

Later, Pete and I found the New York State monument not far from the "bloody angle" where Pickett's charge culminated and on it was a tribute to "Colonel MacDougall".

A few weeks later, I received a letter from Park Ranger John Heise at Gettysburg including a copy of an entry in a 1990 book *Brevet Brigadier Generals in Blue* by Roger D. Hunt and Jack R. Brown. There was our man. Clinton Dugald MacDougall, Brevet Brigadier General, at that point, the other shoe dropped.

Clinton MacDougall was the same

Clinton MacDougall who had been featured in an article that I had written some years ago for the *Tartan* on "MacDougalls in Congress". Following his military service, MacDougall had taken to law, politics and had become a member of congress.

The world of MacDougalls is a small one and it turns out that I had known about General MacDougall all the time. I was also delighted to learn of his Civil War service. ☺

Malcolm (Mac) McDougall stands six-one and weighs 196 pounds, a good proportion of which is well-coordinated muscle. A writer in a recent issue of the "Airwinger", even thought he has a Campbell, found nothing but praise for Mac's ability. Writing of his story, the writer gave him the title "McDougall - athlete who specializes in diversity." 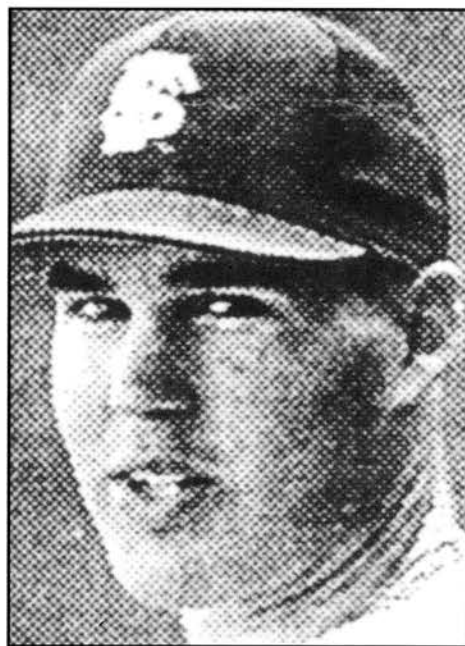

of Maryland in College Park, MD.

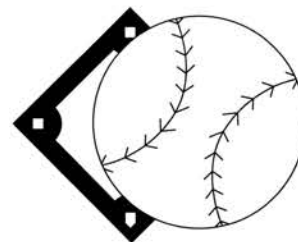
The second baseman opened his astounding day with a RBI single, then hit six straight homers. The junior's seven for seven performance was a school and Atlantic Coast record.
